A few lines my friends...

To say welcome to SCOTTISH HERITAGE SUNDAY. There are some traditions in the life of any church that remind us of our beginnings and one of those here at Highland is our annual Scottish Heritage Sunday. We are reminded of how the Scots came and settled in this Cape Fear Region of the Carolinas long before we had a Declaration of Independence or our Constitution. Religious freedom or the freedom to worship has always been an important part of being Presbyterian in America.

According to Lawrence Bethune the migration of Scottish Highlanders, in particular, to North Carolina began in about 1729 and grew steadily until the outbreak of the American Revolution. The first few Highlanders appear to have settled in the Cape Fear area in 1732. The first large group of Highlanders settled here in 1739, numbered 350, and were from Argyllshire.

The fastest growth appears to have been just before the Revolution in the early 1770s. According to the Earl of Selkirk, by the end of the 18th century, the settlement of Scottish Highlanders in North Carolina was the largest on the North American Continent. Thomas Garnett, in his Tour, published in 1800, estimated that 30,000 Highlanders had immigrated to America between 1773 and 1775, alone. The Highlanders settled in the sand hills area near the upper Cape Fear River of the Coastal Plain, which ran inland to about 100 miles from the ocean. Since the vast majority of Highlanders that settled in this area had come from an agricultural society, and because the land was plentiful and fertile, most became farmers.

The main trading town in the sand hills area at this time was Cross Creek. It was established in 1746 about 90 miles up the Cape Fear River, close to the merge of the Cape Fear River and the Cross Creek. In 1762, Campbellton was established near Cross Creek. In 1778, the towns were combined. After the Revolution, in 1783, the name Cross Creek was changed to Fayetteville, after the French general, Lafayette who assisted the Americans in defeating the British.

As we celebrate our Presbyterian Heritage today we are reminded not only of the many who made such great sacrifices for freedom's sake, but of the Christian principles on which this country was founded. We also acknowledge the rich cultural mix which has come to define our city today. We are glad you are here to worship and we welcome you in the name of Jesus Christ, the center of our worship and the Head of this Presbyterian family of faith.

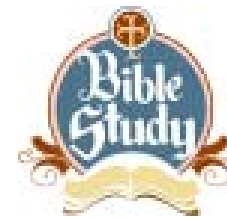

## SCOTTISH HERITAGE SUNDAY

### THE KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS

The Kirkin' in its present form was probably first held in Washington's New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in 1941. The minister was Dr. Peter Marshall, Chaplain of the U.S. Senate. Dr. Marshall was born in Scotland, graduated from Columbia Theological Seminary.

John Knox, the Scottish Reformer, studied under John Calvin, the father of Presbyterianism, in Geneva Switzerland in the 1500s. Upon returning to Scotland, he wrote the first Book of Church Order and established the first Presbyterian churches or Kirks. Immigrants from Scotland and Ireland brought the Presbyterian Church to America and this Cape Fear Region.

Perhaps no symbol is more associated with Scotland and the Scottish tradition than the colorful Highland dress. The ancient tartan was described as "checkered" or "striped" or "sundrei colored." For many centuries, tartans formed part of the everyday dress of the Highland people, and it became recognized as the symbol of clan kinship. Tartans are registered with the Scottish Tartan Society.

During the Middle Ages and through the Reformation, Bibles were rare among common people. The value of the sacred scriptures and the danger of theft led to the establishment of a special office with the Kirk known as "the beadle." The Beadle carried the Bible ceremoniously into the sanctuary and then removed the Bible from the Kirk for safekeeping following the service.

The bagpipe is the national instrument of Scotland. Each clan had its own bagpiper. Crimond, the bagpiper of the clan McLeod, wrote a tune to the 23rd Psalm still used today.
